Deborah Levy trained at Dartington College of Arts, leaving in 1981 to write a number of plays, highly acclaimed for their "intellectual rigour, poetic fantasy and visual imagination". The experience of not having to give her words to a director, actors and designer to interpret was so exhilarating, she wrote a few more. Her most recent novel, *Swimming Home*, was shortlisted for the Man Booker Prize 2012. Levy has just published *Black Vodka: Ten Stories* with And Other Stories.
